As we move into chapter 6, Paul is going to address specific topics. When we look at chapter 7, you'll see Paul refer to questions that were sent to him.

1. Vs. 1-8, Paul addresses the idea of taking fellow members to court. After you have heard an explanation on the video, pause the video.

Why is this such a big deal to Paul? (Notice the contrast between the Greek culture and the Jewish culture.)

What is vitally important to Paul and his desire for the Corinthians?

Vs. 9-11, Paul lists all sorts of sins that were just read on the video. These are not "nice" people and Paul is clear that they will not inherit the Kingdom of God.
